Archbishop's welcome

At Lambeth 2008, Archbishop Rowan Williams sought a more consensual way for the bishops of the Anglican Communion to be together, a process called *Indaba*. In this the focus was on

listening, fellowship and prayer. At the ***Anglican Identity and Mission*** conference we welcome all participants with this similar intention – that in exploring and sharing ideas about ‘being an Anglican today’ we shall grow in our faith.

Why do we want you to join us at the conference on *Anglican Identity and Mission*?

- ◆ for the past generation or two Anglicans around the world have been asking questions about their *belonging, beliefs and mission* as Anglicans
- ◆ Anglicans have always aspired to living with mutual respect and interdependence, allowing for much diversity in *being an Anglican*
- ◆ this is a conference about God and the world, of how Christians worshipping together as Anglicans can live their faith in Christ in a way that is authentic and appealing to others
- ◆ above all, we want you to come and share your faith journey with others and thereby encourage each other in living and proclaiming Jesus Christ as Lord

What might you gain from the conference?

- ◆ the stimulation and affirmation in *being Anglican* which comes from hearing and responding to three outstanding Anglican leaders
- ◆ the encouragement and delight arising from fellowship with fellow Anglicans which will lead to a greater witness to our Christian faith in our daily lives
- ◆ a sense of being part of a wider and lively community of faith which is prepared to be self-critical and reflective in order to better serve our Lord Jesus Christ
- ◆ new friends and new views that God can use to take us into the future



MARTYN PERCY is Principal of Ripon College Cuddesdon and the Oxford Ministry Course. He is also Honorary Professor of Theological Education at King's College London, and Canon Theologian at Sheffield Cathedral.

After a career in publishing, he trained for ordination at Durham. He served as curate at St. Andrew's, Bedford, and was then appointed Chaplain and Director of Studies, Christ's College, Cambridge. He has also served as Adjunct Professor of Theology and Ministry at Hartford Seminar, Connecticut.

His publications include *Clergy: The Origin of Species* (2006) and *Engaging Contemporary Culture: Christianity and the Concrete Church* (2005). His academic writing and research has mostly focused on the study of Christianity in contemporary culture, with interests spanning Anglicanism, theological education and modern ecclesiology (including work on fundamentalism and revivalism). He is a regular contributor to the British newspaper the *Guardian*, BBC Radio 4 and the BBC World Service.

His interests include cinema, reading and listening to jazz. He is married to Rev'd. Emma Percy and they have two sons.



THE RT. REV'D ROBERT FORSYTH is Assistant Bishop in the Diocese of Sydney. He grew up in West Ryde and attended Meadowbank Boys High School and Sydney University. He was converted at the Billy Graham Crusade in Sydney, 1959. Originally Robert was a candidate for the Methodist ministry before becoming an Anglican, studying at Moore College and being ordained. He was Assistant Minister Glenbrook, Assistant Minister Holy Trinity Adelaide, Rector of St Barnabas', Broadway and Chaplain to Sydney University before becoming Bishop of South Sydney in 2000. Robert has served on numerous committees and commissions in the Diocese (including Doctrine and Liturgy) and the National Church (General Standing Committee). Robert is a well known speaker and writer of articles on numerous subjects concerning the gospel and discipleship in the world.

Robert is married to Margaret and they have four children and three grandchildren.



THE VEN. DR SARAH MACNEIL is currently Rector of All Saints Ainslie and Archdeacon in the Diocese of Canberra and Goulburn. Sarah grew up in Hobart and after doing Arts at the University of Tasmania, she joined the Department of Foreign Affairs and spent several years on posting in Stockholm, then into the Department of Trade as a policy officer. During this period Sarah undertook postgraduate study in public administration at the French National School of Administration in Paris. On return to Australia, Sarah studied theology in Canberra and was ordained deacon in 1993 and priest in 1994.

Over the last 15 years she has worked in a variety of positions in the Diocese of Canberra and Goulburn: as a parish priest, a joint rector with her husband, a school chaplain, Rector of All Saints' parish in Ainslie for the last five years, a diocesan Archdeacon for most of the last 8 years, a General Synod representative and Standing Committee member, and Commissary of the Diocese. On July 9th, Sarah will become Dean of St Peter's Cathedral Adelaide.

In 2002 she was awarded a PhD for a thesis on the nexus between Anglican identity and governance.

Sarah is married to Ian and they have three grown children. She enjoys gardening, reading and walking.
